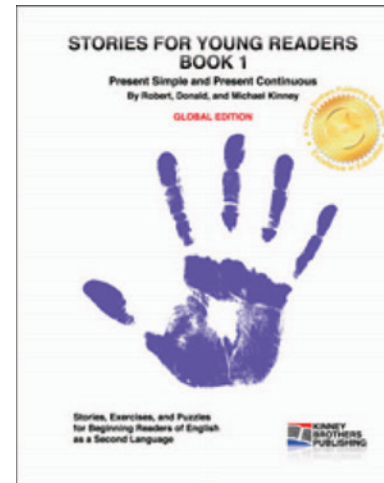

What's Included

I Was in the U.K.

Practice the dialogue below with your mates. Then change the information and practice again!

Mark: Hi, Linda!

Mark: I'm fine. Where were you last week?

Linda: Last week I was in the U.K.

Mark: Really? That's great! Were you in England?

Linda: Yes, I was. I was in England on Monday.

Mark: How about Scotland?

Linda: I was in Scotland on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Mark: Where were you on Thursday?

Linda: I was in Northern Ireland on Thursday and Friday.

Mark: What about Wales?

Linda: Yes, I was in Wales too. I was in Wales on Saturday.

Practice the dialogue below with your mates. Then ask three mates the questions!

Mark: Hello. My name is Mark. Can I ask you some questions?

Thomas: Sure. Go ahead, Mark!

Mark: What's your name?

Thomas: I'm Thomas.

Mark: Can you spell that, please?

Thomas: T-H-O-M-A-S.

Mark: Thank you. How old were you last year?

Thomas: I was sixteen years old.

Mark: Where were you last night at six o'clock?

Thomas: I was at home.

Mark: Where were you this morning at eight o'clock?

Thomas: I was on my bicycle.

Mark: Do you have a pencil case?

Thomas: Yes, I do.

How Was It?

Becky When did you leave home?

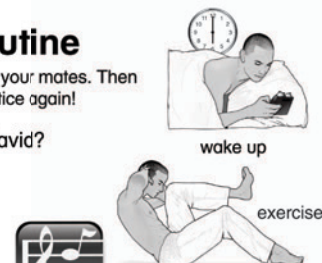
David I left home at eight o'clock. What did you do this morning?
